New Hermitage Construction Update

Progress on the new hermitages of St. Juan Diego, St. Josephine Bakhita, and St. Maximilian Kolbe continues slowly and steadily. Cold weather, supply chain issues, and labor shortages have delayed the entire process. Yet, we continue to be amazed by God's timing. The construction of the hermitage walls at St. Juan Diego began on the feast day of St. Juan Diego, and the construction of St. Josephine Bakhita's porch began on her feast day.

I don't remember exactly when it happened. A friend of our family, Shirley Wanchena, invited me to come to Pacem in Terris whenever I'd like to stay and "just be with God." Pacem was about three miles away from the farmstead of oak woods, pasture, marshes, and meadows where I grew up. "You're going through so much. If you come, two nights is a good start. Then you have a day to just be," said Shirley.

She was right - I had been through a lot. I was in my early 20'-s, and I was hurting, inside and out. My heart was broken by the loss of my youngest brother, Ryan, at age 16, to a car accident. Six months after Ryan's death, I seriously injured my back and over the next year was rarely not in pain.

Shirley was also right about two nights. I did three two-night hermitages over the next year, discerning my vocation. I was stuck. Having bought into the myth of talent being finite, I thought I had reached my limit and set aside my aspirations to be an artist. And with my back in terrible shape, I had reached the end of the practical and

purposeful path of following my father's footsteps into law enforcement. All I really

had was my faith, which, in the end, was all I needed.

If you had asked me then what I did during those hermitages, I would have said I rested, walked, prayed, and asked God what He wanted me to do. Looking back, I realize that I was never alone. I had invited God to be with me in my brokenness. If you ask me now what happened during those hermitages, I'd say He gave me rest, walked with me, prayed with me, and listened to me.

With the help of a talented Pacem staff person, Jan Senn, I wrote my story as an essay for my application to St. John's University, where I went expecting to enroll as a theology major and proceed on to the seminary. The Benedictine monk who was discussing this with me had read my story and was looking over my transcripts. He set it all aside and said, "You've been through so much. You have all those old art credits – if you enroll here as an art major, you'll be out of here a year sooner. That's like putting \$30,000 in your pocket. And if God is calling you to the seminary, you'd come as an

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artist. We don't have many of those." And just like that, art became the most practical path.

Just before I left for St. John's, Shirley invited me to a special evening at Pacem. A new fresco artist friend of theirs, Mark Balma, was going to watch an early cut of a documentary about his creation of an incredible fresco for the University of St. Thomas. "You should stop by and meet Mark; he'd love to have another artist watch the program about his project." It was a lovely evening, and Shirley made sure Mark and I had a chance to connect.

Spring came, and I went home with some art projects to finish over break. I called my friends at Pacem, and offered to stop by with some of my art from St. John's, so they could see the fruit of their generosity. Shirley graciously accepted my offer and gushed

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over all I was doing. "You know, while you were away at St. John's, Mark was invited to become an artist-in-residence at Pacem. Here he could rest after his incredible project, and because he offered a new work for Pacem's soon-to-be-built chapel, we built him a studio. You should stop over there with this wonderful work and share it with him. I will call him, so he knows to expect you. And would you be so kind as to bring this box? It has some things I've been meaning to get to him," she said.

That summer, I became Mark's assistant. The summer apprenticeship became a year of classical art training, and I never returned to St. John's. Mark had opened a door to old-world art training and learning that was completely new to me. I spent the next seven years honing my eye, my hands, and my heart. That pursuit of art gave me everything I feared it couldn't. I met my wife, and we have a family. I continue to grow as an artist, and eventually specialized, in that which was the most difficult for me, landscape painting.

Those hermitages were over 20 years ago. But now, as a landscape painter, they feel much closer. Painting requires me to spend much of my time on my own, but I am no more alone out in the world than I was at Pacem. I often feel that each painting is the best answer I was able to offer to the invitation of the day. But more recently, I've come to understand that my willingness to paint, my willingness to accept the invitation the day has to offer is where it starts. Having seen my brother Ryan's days cut so short filled me with an appreciation for all of my life that has come since. That awareness, that urgency, the not knowing where or what is next all precede the peace that follows after I open my easel, set up my canvas, lay out my colors, hold my brush, and begin.

Shirley's invitation to "just be" still stands, in the hopes that in stillness, you will be moved by this place.

Our Lady of Pacem Furnace Campaign

Since late November 2021, the geo-thermal heat pump serving the chapel in our main building, Our Lady of Pacem, has been inoperable. A second of eight heat pumps stopped working in December. Efforts are underway to replace them, beginning in June. Given that all the heat pumps in the building are 22 years old, they are overdue for replacement. One of the eight was previously replaced two years ago. In February, Pacem's Board of Directors approved replacing seven of the heat pumps at an estimated cost of \$141,000.

This challenging, but necessary, retrofit is required so that Pacem can continue to serve the hermit guests who come to utilize the main building. It's the entry point for every Pacem guest. To date, approximately \$60,000 has been raised toward the total goal.

We are asking Pacem's benefactors to prayerfully consider supporting this tremendous need. By replacing all of the heat pumps at the same time, it will reduce additional labor costs.
